### **Recycling Trial Starting Soon**

From the end of October, dry mixed recycling along Regent, Carlton and Royal Terraces should be put in clear plastic bags for collection from the new green gull-proof sacks that will be provided by the Council. The trial will run for six months, involving 16 streets across the New Town. It is intended to evaluate whether this method of collection, rather than the use of red boxes, will increase the quantity and quality of recycling. It may also provide a cost effective alternative to the large communal bins proposed by the Council. Arrangements for collection of non-recyclable waste, food waste and glass recycling will not change.

Further details of the trial including FAQs will be posted on the RRCTMA website and provided in a separate leaflet for all affected households. The RRCTMA strongly supports this trial as part of



our efforts to avoid the large bin hubs every 100m along the Terraces, and reduce the use of the current communal bins provided for the Mews residents. If you haven't yet received your free green gull-proof sack, please contact us.

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## Speed Watch - Project Update

Traffic speed surveys were conducted in June as part of the Council's ongoing Review of Road Safety for Vulnerable Users. The average speed recorded was 18.2mph for Royal Terrace and 21.2mph for Carlton Terrace. These speeds are within the tolerance limits for a 20mph zone and thus, according to the Council do not justify additional road safety measures. Despite our ongoing consultation with both Councillors and the Road Safety team, we were not consulted with regard to the positioning of the traffic monitors on the Terraces, and feel the choices made were not suitable for our concerns. Additionally, our concerns around poor visibility of signage have not been addressed. Councillors Jo Mowat and Claire Miller are engaging with the Council's Road Safety and Traffic Signage teams for further consultation on improving safety along the Terraces.

## Old Royal High School development update

Given that the development will be a major local construction site, we continue to liaise with key parties concerning the development of the old Royal High School as the new home for St. Mary's Music School. Previously approved plans for the Music School have been modified and a new planning application recently submitted. It had been hoped that the works could begin this October, so that the school could open on-site for students in August 2026, however the Planning Committee will not assess the revised application until November. As a result, the start date for the works has been pushed to January 2023. Committee members met with developer and received reassurances that disruption to residents would be minimised.
