This significant experience meant he was an ideal candidate to be brought in to the Department of Trade and Industry by Michael Heseltine, where

he became an advisor on export to Scandinavia, particularly as by this time he could speak Norwegian!

Eventually Edinburgh managed to draw Ian home to Regent Terrace and Anne. Over these last years both Anne and Ian have done so much for the community within our Terraces. Ian is proud that during his tenure - Regent Terrace was successfully closed to through traffic by bollards, the Tram project didn't close access to the Terraces and the gull-proof rubbish bags eventually arrived. All these issues took time, effort and perseverance from the RRCTA under Ian's professional and jovial stewardship.

But Ian won't have time to be lazy. With his golfing, visits to Orkney, trips to see his 9 grandchildren and more fruitful time to spend in his allotment, he is not hanging his boots up just yet!

Traffic Issues:

There are two potential issues which could have a major impact on accessibility to the Terraces.

- T Junction replacement for London Road roundabout: A project in development as part of the 'Improvement of Leith Walk' scheme, and crucial to the functioning of the Terraces. *More details to follow soon.*
- The Picardy Place Plan: The ongoing proposal to build a hotel on the existing roundabout at Picardy Place which would completely alter the road traffic plan and add several sets of traffic lights. Best information to date can be found if you Google 'Spurtle, Picardy Place Plans' for more info.

Very few applications in the last couple of months. Three houses in Regent Terrace are undergoing transformation and there have been several applications for new and refurbished skylights. And one application for a flagpole!

Terraces Housekeeping

Bin Etiquette: 2013 saw the introduction of black gull proof bags. Initial feedback has been very positive. To help keep visible rubbish to a minimum, the following guidelines are recommended:

Only present containers for emptying on day of collection:

- · Black gull proof bags Friday 5.45pm.
- · Grey food bins/red & blue boxes Friday from 8am.

Help to keep the pavements clear - Please bring in all empty rubbish receptacles *as soon* as possible.

Reduce bin sightings in the Mews – please keep green wheelie bins in garages, discreet areas or hidden behind large plants when at all possible.

KEEP OUR STREETS SAFE AND LIT!

Do you know how to report a street light fault? If you spot a light out on the road/pavement just follow these 3 easy steps:

Step 1: Make a note of the street light column number (located below the street light), light location (e.g. outside 33 Royal Terrace) and what the problem is (e.g. bulb blown).

Step 2: Email the details to: clarence@edinburgh.gov. uk or phone City Development on 0800 232323.

Step 3: Check your light is back on within 7 days.

Fascinating fact - the lighting maintenance team will attend to over 23,000 faults in a typical year.
